Nursery Spring 1 Curriculum Leaflet 2023/24 Ms McLoughlin



Here is an overview of the curriculum covered in Spring 1. This can be used as a guidance of how to help you child at home. If you require any further information, please contact your class teacher.



Personal, Social and Emotional Development



Communication and Language

Your child will be encouraged to:

- •Find solutions to conflicts e.g. accepting that not everyone can be Spider-Man in the game.
- •Show understanding and cooperate with boundaries and routines of the nursery.
- •Become more independent with self-care skills
- •Express their feelings to others

How to help at home: Encouraging your child to do things on my own or getting me to help with everyday tasks. E.g.tidying toys away.



Your child will be encouraged to develop their communication skills bv:

- Using a wider range of vocabulary
 - Listening to stories and remembering much of what happens
- Understanding a question or instruction that has two parts, such as: "Get your coat and wait at the door"
- Start a conversation with an adult or a friend

How to help at home: Encourage your child to talk to you about songs and stories they are learning and ask them questions.



Literacy



Understanding the World

Core English texts:

Rosie's Walk/ Lulu Gets a Cat

Your child will be encouraged to:

- Listen and recall stories
- Retell stories using puppets, story actions and roleplay
- Learn and retell nursery rhymes
- Learn about the different names of parts of a book

Writina:

- Build our fine and gross motor strength by exploring different different surfaces/materials for mark making activities
- Begin to write initial letter of name.

Phase 1 Phonics

Rhyme and rhythm - with a focus on developing children's experiences of rhythm and rhyme in speech.

How to help at home: Encouraging your child to practise mark making, to improve their finger strength, using different tools such as chunky pens, chalk and crayons. Continue reading a range of stories supporting your child to understand new vocabulary.

This term our topic is focused on Pets and Farm Animals

Your child will have opportunities to:

- Use their senses to explore/discuss the natural environment and living things
- Learn about animal environments /habitats, adult and baby animals
- Learn about how to care and look after farm animals and
- Talk about their own life experiences e.g. having/experiencing pets in their families, visits to see farm animals etc
- Talk about the seasons, weather and days of the week.
- Talk about people who help us e.g. vets, farmers

How to help at home: Support your child to talk about where different animals live and the difference between their habitats. Also have a further discussion about the different types of animals you could have in your home as a pet.



Mathematics



Expressive Arts and Design

Your child will have opportunities to:

- Show 'finger numbers' up to 5.
- Develop fast recognition of up to 3 objects, without having to count them individually.
- Link numerals and amounts: for example, showing the right number of objects to match the numeral, up to 5.
- Describe a familiar route

How to help at home: Use opportunities in the environment to support your child's development in number e.g. counting steps, looking at bus/door numbers, helping to collect items when shopping

Your child will have opportunities to:

- Sing with pitch and melody familiar songs
- Sing familiar songs and create movement in response to
- Explore digital images of pets and farm animals (various
- Begin to develop complex stories using small world equipment like animals, dolls and dolls house.
- Join different materials and explore different textures.

How to help at home: Encourage your child to develop their drawing and model making.



Physical Development



Reminders

Your child will be supported to develop their physical skills by:

Continuing to learn to use a comfortable grip with good control when holding pens and pencils.

The children will spend time learning basic principles of a PE lesson such as:

- Finding space
- Using and sharing equipment
- working individually, with a partner and group
- And the physical: running, jumping, throwing, catching, rolling, skipping

How to help at home: Have a play outdoors every day, encouraging your child to take safe risk in their physical activities.

- Please ensure that your child is in school at all times (excluding when they are ill) as any time missed will affect your child's learning.
- Please read and share books with your child daily.
- Children need to bring in a named water bottle.
- Please remember to keep your plastic bag with extra clothes for your child topped up. Please label items of clothing.
- The staff will support your child to change their class library book on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
